8. Arrogant Self-Defense. Explain how was sin affecting society. (Gen. 4:23-24)

D. The Culture of Seth. (Adam's Godly Replacement Offspring.) Gen. 4:25-26

4. What is significant, in this chapter, about the line of Seth?
5. Which is more important to you? Advancing in culture or worshiping God?
