¹ Psalm 134 Superscription: Song of Ascents: See note on Psalm 120 for discussion. This psalm constitutes a fitting benediction to the Songs of Ascents (120-134). The setting for this delightful hymn is evening, and the departing worshipers hail the priests and Levites standing in the house of <u>Yahweh</u> to bless Him throughout the night. In turn, the gathered priests and Levites offer a farewell blessing upon the departing worshipers that <u>Yahweh</u>, the Creator of both heavens and earth, might bless them from <u>Zion</u>, the earthly home in which He condescends to dwell. It is a fond, worshipful, benedictory farewell.
